


A couple of students proceeded to Zone, which is brilliant and a few of them made it to even higher levels. We congratulate all these students who made incredible achievements.

We respectfully did a 1-minute silence to think about and


remember those who have fallen in war. It is always done after listening to "The Last Post", the bugle call that was played when the day's activities were over.


"Where Is The Green Sheep" is a book that we recommend for children 6 years and under.

This book is definitely a five star rating.






#### PICK FOR STAGE 1 (YEAR 1 AND 2) - "THELMA THE UNICORN" by Aaron Blabey

#### PICK FOR STAGE 2 - "DIARY OF A WIMPY KID" SERIES by Jeff Kinney




#### PICK FOR STAGE 3 - "HARRY POTTER" SERIES by JK Rowling
